Short-Lived Movement

In a dramatic turn of events at Boys State, William Tabb — a well-informed and articulate candidate for governor who was eliminated in the primary election — became the face of an attempted third, independent party movement. While the initiative quickly gained attention and a strong backing, it ultimately was too late for this wild idea to gain official traction. The idea to form an independent party did not originate with Tabb himself. Instead, several delegates, frustrated by what

they perceived as an election driven more by popularity than policy, approached Tabb, encouraging him to lead an alternative effort. Recognized for his strong grasp of policy and state government, Tabb was seen as an ideal figurehead for a new direction. “People aren’t only voting based off qualifications, popularity and city politics are both main factors people are considering over character and qualifications” Tabb said. The movement gained brief but strong momentum, attracting support from

delegates from multiple cities and both parties who shared Tabb’s concerns and admired his courage to challenge the status quo. For a moment, it appeared the initiative might reshape the political landscape of Boys State. However, the effort was soon met with resistance from the Boys State Administration who cited the rules pertaining to third parties that stated it must have been done by 1:30 Monday and Tuesday afternoon was too late.
